ENTRIES

Entry forms (on page 26) should reach the Show Organiser or be deposited at Frensham Village Shop no later than 12 noon on Thursday, 30th August 2018.

All exhibits must be staged between 9.15am and 10.45am on the morning of the Show, and before leaving exhibitors should check with the Stewards that their exhibits and entry slips are correctly placed in the appropriate Class. Please note the above times are slightly later than previous years.

The Show is open to the public between 2.30pm and 4.00pm after which exhibits are to be collected.

NOTES FOR EXHIBITORS

All exhibits in the Floral Arrangements, (except class 2), Flowers, Shrubs and Vegetables Sections must have been grown in the exhibitor's garden or allotment and be entered in his/her name.

Exhibitors must supply their own vases, dishes and other containers.

No exhibitor may enter more than one exhibit in any one Class.

Junior classes are restricted to those aged 15 and under. To assist the Judges write the age of the child on the reverse of the entry slip and display next to their entry.

Open classes - exhibitors need not be members of the Society.

Exhibitors may include the name and variety of the flowers, plants, fruit and vegetables that they exhibit. This is purely for the interest of other exhibitors and visitors and no points will be earned or deducted whether or not this is done.

FLORAL ARRANGEMENTS

Note: an arrangement consists of flowers and/or foliage only (i.e. no accessories) unless otherwise expressly stated.

Class

1. The Joy of Colour. Not to exceed 60cm in width and 80cm in height.
2. September Changes. An arrangement to include seed heads. Not to exceed 60cm in width and 80cm in height. This class can include bought flowers, foliage and vegetables.
3. **Open class:** A container of mixed garden flowers – number of kinds and stems, sprays or branches at exhibitor's discretion. (may include flowering shrubs).
4. **Open class – Juniors:** Late summer colour in a vase, not to exceed 60cm in width and 80cm in height.

FLOWERS, SHRUBS AND POTTED PLANTS

Note: cut flowers and shrubs should be displayed in a vase, bowl, bottle or similar container, unless otherwise specifically stated.

Class

5. Miniature Rose, – 1 stem or spray. Blooms may be single, semi-double or double.
6. Cluster-flowered Rose (Floribunda) – 1 stem or spray.
7. Large flowered Rose (Hybrid Tea) – 1 stem.
8. Large flowered Rose, (not Hybrid Tea), one or more varieties – 3 stems.
9. Roses, one or more varieties – 5 stems.
10. Dahlia – 1 stem.
11. Dahlias, one or more varieties – 3 stems.
12. Dwarf Michaelmas Daisies, one or more varieties – 3 stems or sprays.
13. Standard Michaelmas Daisies, one or more varieties – 3 stems or sprays.
14. Japanese Anemone – 1 stem or spray.

FLOWERS, SHRUBS AND POTTED PLANTS (cont)

Class

15. Echinacea – 1 stem.
16. Fuchsias, one or more varieties – 6 florets, arranged on moss.
17. Herbaceous perennial, one variety – 3 stems or sprays.
18. Herbaceous perennials, 3 distinct varieties – 3 stems or sprays of each.
19. Annuals*, one variety – number of stems or sprays at exhibitor's discretion.
20. Annuals*, one or more varieties – 5 stems or sprays.
21. Any flowering plant other than a Rose, Michaelmas daisy or Dahlia – 1 stem, spike or spray.
22. Flowering shrub – 1 stem, spray or branch.
23. Flowering shrubs, 4 different kinds – 1 stem, spray or branch of each.
24. Shrub or tree bearing berries – 1 stem, spray or branch.
25. Ornamental foliage, 4 different kinds – 1 stem, spray or branch of each.
26. Pot of growing pelargonium(s) – pot not to exceed 30cm in diameter.
27. Pot of growing annuals* – pot not to exceed 30cm in diameter.
28. Penstemons – 3 stems of one cultivar or mixed.
29. **Open class:** A container of mixed stems, sprays or branches bearing seeds, hips or pods etc. No flowers.
30. **Open class - Juniors:** Grow a sunflower, the one with the greatest diameter head including petals is the winner.

Note: * an annual is any flower raised from seed during the twelve months preceding the Show.

VEGETABLES

Note: vegetables should be displayed on a plate, shallow dish or similar container, unless otherwise stated.

Class

31. Tomatoes, small fruited and cherry cultivars (not exceeding 3.5cm in diameter) – 5, with stalks.
32. Tomatoes, medium (approx. 3.5 to 6.5cm in diameter) – 5, with stalks.
33. Runner Beans – 5, with stalks.
34. Potatoes – 5.
35. Carrots – 3, tops trimmed to approx 8cm.
36. Courgettes – 2, up to 21cm in length, with stalks.
37. Beetroot – 3, tops trimmed to approx 8cm.
38. Onions – 3, tops tied and trimmed.
39. A string of onions (at least 10).
40. Cucumbers – 2, with stalks.
41. Sweet corn – 2 cobs, with beards, stalks and a quarter of the grain exposed by removing a number of husks from tip to base).
42. Any other vegetable not listed above – number at exhibitor's discretion.
43. A collection of vegetables in a basket, measuring no more than 80cm in length.
44. Three different vegetables to accompany a Sunday roast – number at exhibitor's discretion.
45. Culinary herbs - 5 named kinds (no flowers), in a vase or similar container. A maximum of three stems of each herb

FUN CLASSES

46. **Open class:** The heaviest pumpkin.
47. **Open class:** The longest bean pod.

FRUIT

Note: fruit should be displayed on a plate, shallow dish or similar container, unless otherwise stated.

Class

48. Dessert Apples – 3.
49. Cooking Apples – 3.
50. Plums – 5, with stalks.
51. Pears – 3, with stalks.
52. Blackberries – 10, with stalks.
53. Raspberries – 10, with stalks.
54. Any other fruit not listed above - number at exhibitor's discretion.
55. A collection of fruit in a bowl, maximum 45cm in diameter, to be judged for effect.

HOME INDUSTRIES – OPEN CLASSES

Note: all edible items must be covered for reasons of hygiene, and there must be no logos or trade names on jars or lids.

Class

56. Soft fruit jam, (named and dated – day/month/year).
57. Mint jelly, (named and dated – day/month/year).
58. Marbled chocolate crumb cake. (Following the recipe on page 28).
59. Knitted bobble hat. (Following the pattern available from the Frensham Village Shop or at www.fdhs.org.uk).
60. **Juniors:** A pine cone creature. Use a pine cone for the body and add any other materials.

PHOTOGRAPHY – OPEN CLASSES

Note: prints only, unmounted, not to exceed 205mm x 255mm or (8" x 10"). Photographs can be cropped and printed at home: digital enhancement is not allowed.

62. Portrait of a tree.
63. Geometry in nature.
64. **Juniors:** A photograph of a relative.

for the highest points total in Classes 5 to 30, Flowers, Shrubs, and Potted Plants.

BILL OTHEN VASE

judged the best exhibit in Classes 10 to 11, Dahlias.

STEVENS CUP

for the highest points total in Classes 31 to 45, Vegetables.

ATHERTON CUP

judged the best exhibit in Class 43, Collection of Vegetables.
